

DEPARTMENT OF COMMUNITY AFFAIRS OVERVIEW

Agency Responsibilities

The Department of Community Affairs is the state's land planning and community development agency. The department seeks to ensure that new growth complies with the state's growth management laws, assist established communities in revitalizing their older neighborhoods, and plan for and responds to both natural and man-made disasters.

Agency Organization

The department is organized into three divisions.

- The Division of Community Planning is responsible for administering state growth management programs. These include the Local Government Comprehensive Planning Program, which reviews local comprehensive plans and plan amendments for compliance with Florida's Growth Management Act, and the Development of Regional Impact Program, which reviews large scale developments that would have a substantial effect upon the health, safety, or welfare of citizens of more than one county. The division also administers the Areas of Critical State Concern Program, which protects resources of major statewide significance. Designated Areas of Critical State Concern are the City of Apalachicola, the City of Key West and the Florida Keys, the Green Swamp and the Big Cypress Swamp.
- The Division of Housing and Community Development administers state and federal programs designed to provide community and economic development assistance to agencies at the local level. The division coordinates state and federal grants to Florida's communities. The division also staffs the

Florida Building Commission, which implements and regulates the unified statewide code for all buildings and structures in Florida. The division also includes the Florida Communities Trust (FCT), which provides financial grants to help local governments acquire conservation and recreation lands, and working waterfronts.

• The Division of Emergency Management is responsible for ensuring that Florida is prepared to respond to and recover from natural and man-made emergencies and seeks to mitigate their effects. The division is a separate budget entity and is not subject to the department's control, supervision, or direction. However, the department is responsible for providing the division with finance and accounting, budgeting, personnel, purchasing, legal, inspector general, and information technology services.¹

The Florida Housing Finance Corporation is also located within the department. The corporation works to increase the supply of safe affordable housing by stimulating investment of private capital and by encouraging public and private sector housing partnerships. The corporation is a separate budget entity and is not subject to the department's control, supervision, or direction.²



Agency Resources

As shown in Exhibit 2, the Legislature appropriated \$179,205,646 and 214 full-time equivalent positions to the department for Fiscal Year 2008-09. This represented an 8.6%

decrease in funding and a 7% decrease in positions compared to the previous fiscal year.

The Florida Government Accountability Act Sunset Reviews

The 2006 Legislature passed the Florida Government Accountability Act (Ch. 2006-146, *Laws of Florida*) to create a Sunset review process. The act

- establishes the process, criteria, and schedule for the Legislature to assess whether state agencies and advisory committees need to continue to exist;
- provides for the creation of a Legislative Sunset Advisory Committee and describes the membership and organization of the committee and committee duties;
- requires reports and assistance from state agencies and the Legislature's Office of Program Policy Analysis and Government Accountability (OPPAGA).

Using these reports and other information, the Sunset Advisory Committee is to produce a report that includes recommendations to abolish, continue, or reorganize an agency or advisory committee under review.

Agencies to be reviewed by July 1, 2010:

- (a) Department of Children and Family Services
- (b) Department of Community Affairs
- (c) Department of Management Services
- (d) Department of State
